Visit the newly renovated Auraria Library. This tri-institution shared facility is located in the heart of downtown Denver. Since the library opened in 1976, the campus has experienced exponential growth of the student body, from 10,000 in the 1970s to 51,000 today. Their comprehensive redesign accommodated increased student numbers, as well as alignment with changing higher education teaching practices and learning theories. Phased construction ensured that the building remained open through the multi-year renovation. You will have the opportunity to take a comprehensive tour of the newly-renovated facility and have a discussion with key stakeholders.

#### Post-Conference Workshop: Technology Integration: Planning and Managing Large Scale Digital Displays

Growing numbers of libraries are installing large scale, high resolution digital displays. These systems are exciting tools for visualization, research, communication, and productivity in libraries. They catalyze campus engagement, expose special collections, showcase research discoveries, and support digital scholarship. Such venues also reposition academic libraries in campus teaching and learning activities. Should you implement these display systems at your institution? Learn the important considerations for planning, designing, constructing, managing, and evaluating digital displays to support your decision making process. In this session, you will:

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# INSTRUCTORS

#### Niraj Chaudhary, Director of Technology and Digital Initiatives for University Libraries, University of the Pacific

In his current role, Niraj Chaudhary provides leadership in the development and implementation of technologies that enhance teaching and learning. At Pacific, Niraj is leading the technology planning and budget development for a comprehensive facility renovation of the Stockton campus library. Previously, he served as Head of Information and Educational Technology Services for Auraria Library, which serves University of Colorado Denver, Metropolitan State University of Denver, and Community College of Denver. At Auraria Library, he provided technology vision and led many successful technology implementations, including the Discovery Wall during its comprehensive facility renovation from 2008 to 2016.

#### Nancy Fried Foster, Library Design Anthropologist, Higher Education

Nancy Fried Foster is a design anthropologist who helps libraries, colleges, universities, and cultural institutions use ethnographic and participatory methods to understand their users and then design spaces, services, and technologies to meet their needs. Dr. Foster served for three years as Senior Anthropologist at Ithaka S+R and for ten years as director of anthropological research for the University of Rochester's River Campus Libraries. Since 2009, she has worked through the American International Consortium of Academic Libraries (AMICAL) to introduce participatory design and work-practice study to colleges and universities around the world, and from 2007 to 2013 she delivered workshops in the US through the Council on Library and Information Resources (CLIR). Dr. Foster is an author with Patricia Steele, et al. of The Living Library: An Intellectual Ecosystem; edited Studying Students: A Second Look; and co-edited with Susan Gibbons Studying Students: The Undergraduate Research Project at the University of Rochester.

#### Cynthia Hashert, Interim Director, Associate Director for Education, Research, and Access Services, Auraria Library

Cynthia has been an active participant since 2009 in the renovation of the Auraria Library, which serves three institutions of higher education, the University of Colorado Denver, Metropolitan State University of Denver, and Community College of Denver. Throughout the multi-year projects, Cynthia convened essential conversations that ensured robust campus relationships and staff engagement. Reflective of her highly consultative approach, she invited students' research-based design recommendations and advanced campus learning partners' collaborations. Within the library organization, she furthered staff appreciation for repurposing facility spaces and, concurrently, reinventing service models. Cynthia's visionary leadership guaranteed inclusive participation and responsive design. She earlier held positions at the University of Texas at Arlington libraries and earned a MLIS from the University of North Texas.

#### Lotte J. Kaefer, AIA LEED, AP BD+C, EHDD Architecture

Lotte is an architect with over 18 years' experience in designing educational and cultural facilities. With a passion for the design of public buildings that teach and contribute to communities, she has cemented her experience through the complexities of high performance, sustainable buildings. She brings a sensitive approach to buildings that fit place with thoughtful interior design that can answer the changing needs of users. Her diversity of experience ranges from libraries, to zoos and net zero energy buildings. She relishes anticipating challenges and navigating the appropriate solution with the design team and stakeholders alike. Lotte's recent work includes the SFMOMA Expansion and the Packard Foundation Headquarters. She is currently working on the Library Renovation at University of Pacific in California.

Lotte received her degree in Urban Design and Architecture from The Royal Academy of Fine Arts in Copenhagen, Denmark, and has studied at both the University of Sydney and UC Berkeley.

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# INSTRUCTORS

#### Joseph Montalbano, Principal-In-Charge and Library Design Specialist, Studiotrope

Joseph, a library design specialist and founding partner of Studiotrope, has spent the past 18 years working with library clients to bring their buildings into alignment with their missions. He strongly believes we must first understand projects from the user experience perspective before we can start suggesting architectural solutions. Joseph has traveled and studied libraries across the nation and understands that contemporary libraries are in constant flux and must be recognized as very dynamic environments. In fact, Studiotrope was conceived so that Joseph could focus on the ever-changing role of the library in the eyes of its users. This journey has fostered memberships and partnerships with library organizations, including ALA, PLA, and CAL, and led to speaking engagements at local and national conferences.

Joseph was also an adjunct professor at the University of Colorado College of Architecture for several years and taught previously at Arizona State University. Joseph has been a registered architect in the state of Colorado since 1996. He has a Master of Architecture from Arizona State University in Tempe, and a Bachelor of Science in Architectural Studies from the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana where he studied two semesters abroad.

#### Lee van Orsdel, Previous Dean of Libraries - Grand Valley State University

Lee has forty-five years of leadership experience in academic libraries in Alabama, Kentucky and Michigan, including reorganization, staff development, leadership, program innovation and library design. Recently retired, Van Orsdel was dean of university libraries at Grand Valley State University from 2005 to 2016. Under her leadership GVSU libraries won the 2012 ACRL Excellence in Academic Libraries Award for universities and the 2014 State Librarian's Excellence Award. Van Orsdel supplied the vision for Grand Valley's new main library, which was designed by Stantec Architecture. The \$65 million, LEED Platinum project opened in June 2013 and has since welcomed almost four million visitors. A multi-faceted post-occupancy study by Steelcase Corporation confirmed that the vision was fully fully realized. In September the library was named a New Landmark Library by Library Journal.

#### Mary M. Somerville, University Librarian, University Libraries at University of the Pacific

Dr. Mary M. Somerville serves as University Librarian since 2016 for University Libraries at University of the Pacific, one university with campuses in San Francisco, Sacramento, and Stockton, California. At Pacific, she advances a comprehensive library facility renovation, her second. From 2008 - 2015, she furthered fund raising and vision setting for design and construction of the Auraria Library, a shared facility academic library serving University of Colorado Denver, Metropolitan State University of Denver, and Community College of Denver.

## **Tod R. Stevens, Principal, Stantec**

Tod Stevens offers insight into trends and strategies for effective planning of modern academic libraries. He has more than twenty years of architectural experience, with a focus on design, and an expertise in library planning. Tod leads Stantec Architecture's library research and benchmarking team and has been very hands-on--conducting both primary and secondary research on libraries, visiting state-of-the-art institutions, speaking nationally, and attending American Library Association (ALA) conferences.

He has attended a variety of Harvard's Graduate School of Design Executive Education programs, focusing on planning and design of libraries. Through these endeavors, Tod is able to approach projects with progressive problem-solving techniques and is able to develop innovative solutions specific to the issues facing today's libraries.


#### Mark Walters, Category Product Manager, Steelcase Education Solutions
